ALUMNI WEEKEND 2022 IN REVIEW



UKRAINE...THE POURING OUT OF MANY HEARTS

There are moments in history that are as pivotal as they are terrifying—the 2005 London bombing, 9/11, Iraq and Afghanistan wars, Boston Marathon bombing, and most recently, Russia declaring war on Ukraine. Pivotal...because they reshape towns and cities, the nation and world. Terrifying... because they directly impact lives-most importantly, families.

Following the invasion of Ukraine, Pastor Violeta "Violet" Bilan, associate pastor of the Living Word Adventist Church in Oregon City, OR, started receiving requests from Ukrainians—desperate parents were reaching out to get their children to America for safety and an education. Ukrainian herself, Pastor Violet contacted MBA hoping for possibilities. Everything these families owned was confiscated, leaving them with no money. Regardless, MBA said yes to four students. What follows is their stories.

Sasha Zhukovskyi '25 "I come from the city of Lutsk, near Poland and Belarus. I was able to leave Ukraine after the first three months of the war. My grandfather was killed by Russian shells near the capital of Ukraine. All my studies had to be completely remote. Many of my friends went abroad with their families to escape the war and are now all studying throughout Europe. All my life I dreamed of studying in America, but due to my circumstances, that did not happen. After learning about the sponsored studies in America, I hoped that dream could be fulfilled. Now I study at MBA, where I have many new friends and cool teachers."

Masha Subbotina '24 "I was born in Belarus, but have lived in Russia since I was six years old. The United States has made a strong impression since I arrived here and now realize that the US is the place where I want to be. People respect each other. Teachers communicate with students on an equal footing without a sense of superiority. The discourse is very civil. People always feel that they have freedom and choice.

I began my preparation to apply for

admission to an American university in the 9th grade. Simultaneously, I developed an interest in civil rights—an important issue that has always been in the forefront of my mind. In Russia, it's almost impossible to be a free citizen. People are discriminated against based on their ethnic origin, sexual orientation, or religion. Then the war with Ukraine began, putting everything in perspective and

becoming a turning point for my family. My mother made superhuman efforts to enable me to leave Russia. A friend of mine recommended I try to attend MBA, and I soon realized that my values and the school's values matched. After I wrote the letter to the school, I have experienced sympathy and understanding for my family's plight.

From my first day at MBA, I felt welcomed and developed a deep sense of belonging. I have never met such kind, open, and com-



passionate people who are willing to listen and teach others. At times, I am pierced by a sense of disbelief at how lucky I am to be here-instead of where kids, a little older than me, are sent to war. I cannot express how grateful I am for the opportunity to be in a place where I am respected, appreciated, and able to study and learn new things."

Yaryna Yarosh '25 "I'm from Ukraine. I always planned to graduate from school, then come to Adventist university. Since first grade, my dream was to go to the United States and learn at a great university. Since the war started, I lost peace for a couple of months. The first two weeks were stressful for me and my family because we were in the bombings. God gave us a chance to move to the west of Ukraine where it was safer. After we moved, my mum told me that I might have an opportunity to go to the United States for high school! We worked quickly to gather my documents and send them to the person who told my mum the news. A few days later, I got an email from Pastor Kevin at MBA and had an interview with him. I prayed to go to this school and God answered my prayers. I'm so

these students and their families have had their lives disrupted in ways that we do not and can not understand.

God provided opportunities for these students to escape circumstances beyond their control. As Ruta stated, these students have placed their trust in Him. MBA also puts its trust in Him as staff work to lead students to His glory.

MBA AQUATICS REPAIR

ompleted in 1965, the MBA pool is a benefit to our curriculum; lifeguard training and certification, scuba and swimming classes, as well as a central component to our summer camp activities.

The pool's heaters failed last winter. During that repair, a survey was conducted of all the pool's operating systems; the filtration system was in poor condition, the pool lights had been out of service, pool paint was peeling, and more.

By early summer, the pool had been refurbished. A coordinated effort of volunteers, paid service technicians, MBA staff, and donors were all needed accomplish the many tasks needed to bring the pool up to date.

Leading the project was a nearly full-time job for Don Riggs. Don is a professional artist and works in various mediums: stone and bronze sculpture, acrylic painting, and jewelry. A lifelong passion for swimming and scuba diving led to Don volunteering to take on the pool as his gift to MBA. Don had already been servicing the pool for almost

three years. Don's project management has provided MBA with an amazing pool that now has state-of-the-art heaters, filtration, programmable chemical delivery systems, as well as paint and lighting. As with most projects, significant challenges caused work stoppages: global supply chain issues, inspections, consultant and technician availability, and making sure that the systems were correctly sized for the volume of MBA's pool and that the systems met current codes while interfacing with existing infrastructure.

With the pool fully operational, MBA is able reinstate classes taught for credit. Scuba instruction begins this fall, with a new class starting approximately every six weeks throughout the school year. The Surf Club uses the pool for basic safety and familiarization with surf equipment. In addition to course instruction, the pool is available for organized class events, as well as open swim during evening recreation times.

happy that I'm in this beautiful school with amazing teachers and friendly classmates."

Ruta Babych '25 "I had a really hard time when the war started. I was worried about my family and friends. After living with sirens and under the bombs for a week, my family moved to our relatives in Poland. The part that hurt the most was that my dad and brother had to stay in Ukraine. I was worried

every day from all the terrible news we heard. People died every single day. My sister was very anxious as well as my mom. I realized that only God could help us.

One of the Bible verses that helped me to cope with all those terrible feelings was PSALM 56:3 (NIV). It says, *When I am afraid, I put my trust in you*. We prayed every day so God would save our motherland and help us find a way to live on. At the end of April, my

mum got a call from my aunt. She told us about a school that might give me a chance to get a great education and stay safe. I couldn't say no. It was the only choice I had—for which I'm extremely thankful. MBA gave me a real opportunity to reach some of my life goals and even my dreams. I couldn't be more thankful. And I thank God every day for what He has done for my family—and for me especially."

A similar map was printed in the Fall 2008 issue of Sandscripts. Since then, MBA's presence around our world has continued to grow with visits to 12 countries and 15 US states. We have been on MISSION TRIPS to Brazil, Cambodia, Costa Rica, Fiji, and the Philippines where MBA students spread the Word of God in helping with Vacation Bible Schools, building churches and schools, delivering school supplies, assisting teachers in classroom projects, and cleaning up hurricaneravaged towns, cities and beaches. Talents were also shared on Music TOURS to Alaska, Canada, and Hawaii. HISTORY lessons were taught outside the classroom as students visited Ellis Island and the Statue of Liberty. They stood where Abraham Lincoln gave the Gettysburg Address, watched the changing of the guard at the tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington National Cemetery, walked on the ground where the Civil War was fought, and visited the 9/11 Memorial. EDUCATIONAL TOURS visited the countries of Austria, Germany, and Switzerland, immersing



students in the culture, language, food, and way of life of the local people. ALTHLETIC TEAMS have worked hard to better their skills as they play fellow Christian athletes around the country.

Education is more than learning information in a classroom from a textbook; it's more than a field trip or a music tour. True education is about creating experiences and providing knowledge that will forever change the hearts, minds, and lives of students.

so, what's in store for the 2022–2023 school year? The History tour just returned from a trip to New York, Massachusetts, and several New England states. Student athletes will play in various Friendship Tournaments around California. Oceanaires and Westwinds music groups will travel to Orlando, FL this year, sharing their musical talents. This year's mission trip will head to Puerto Rico to help clean beaches, paint a church, and participate in the local Sabbath church services. THE PROJECT SHOP

A Model for STEM Learning by Jay Ketelsen '76, VP for Operations

arlene Grunke often reminded me how deeply her father placed the importance for students to have the opportunity to learn through their hands in both the classroom and at work. Almost seven and a half decades have passed since MBA's founding and it is exciting to see third-party industries on campus collaborate to create "real world" classrooms in technological environments.

In the spring of 2022, Craig Calfee, Chris Bley, and Arthur Siordia Sr. presented a STEM learning concept to the MBA school board and the concept was unanimously accepted for the 2022-2023 school year. Craig Calfee of Calfee Design and Chris Bley of AirSpace Integration are two entrepreneurs with independent companies on our campus that are deeply engaged in providing opportunities for MBA students to gain hands on experience in presently relevant and emerging technologies. Arthur Siordia Sr. is a respected aeronautical developer with a pedigree that includes more than a decade of engineering work at Mojave Air and Space. Together, they have created a concept classroom that is now a reality called The Project Shop.

The Project Shop is a designated classroom in the on-campus Calfee Design company facilities. Calfee Design is known throughout the world as an innovator in bicycle tech-



nology design and production. Calfee and his team of talented technicians have created a research and development (R&D) portion of the business to explore and push the boundaries in current and emerging technologies. Projects that are advancing the capabilities in aerodynamics, alternative propulsion, and small, efficient, renewable energy systems. Many of the projects that are developed at Calfee Design are intended for use in emerging nations, such as easily transportable solar systems to power remote irrigation systems and lightweight electric cargo motorcycles with quick-swap solar-charged batteries. The result of these efforts do change lives for the better across cultures worldwide.

Racing, be it bicycles, boats, cars, motorcycles, or airplanes, has always been a key source of advancing technology that flows directly to improved and efficient products. Calfee Design is regularly contracted to provide R&D for companies and individuals seeking the utmost in efficient aerodynamics, lightweight durable construction, and emerging power systems. Roadable vehicles that convert to gyrocopters, streamlining projects, and more happen in this shop—a shop where now MBA students meet twice weekly for hands on learning.

AirSpace Integration (ASI) provides R&D opportunities for scientific and commercial drone research, US Navy Weather station research—all at MBA, in addition to coordinating the use of the MBA airfield and airspace. Technical work in support of SpaceX launches is also provided by ASI, with some of that support work being done on MBA's campus. With ASI involvement, The Project Shop students will have exposure to these science venues when aspects of their projects share purposes and opportunities.

Arthur Siordia is deeply involved with the R&D aspects on campus and he also assists as a presenter and shop mentor for the MBA's Exploring Aviation and ground school class. He is also the curator of the campus aviation classroom hanger where a RotorWay two-seat kit helicopter, wwi Nieuport 17 C.1 replica, Frontier STOL prototype airplane, three canard-style aircraft (Cozy all-composite, original Rutan VariEze, and American Aerolights Falcon ultralight), kit-built Zenith STOL CH 701, and Bede BD-5 kit jet is stored. These



ROBOTICS/STEM CLUB

ith the new school year underway, MBA is also starting a brand new afterschool program: Robotics/ STEM Club [science, technology, engineering, math]. Led by Jovinia Mustard, teacher at VHM Christian School and mother to Timothy Mustard '25, the club will meet once a week with a lead engineer mentor and interested students. The team will hone teamwork skills, fundraise, as well as build and program an industrial-size robot to compete on a difficult field game against teams from other Adventist academies. The students' efforts will help them prepare for the 2023 championship tournament that will take place at Forest Lake Academy in Florida.

"The STEM club is a great opportunity for students to get hands-on experience working with materials and problem solving in a way that meaningfully reflects a professional engineering work environment," says Charles Neumeyer, engineer mentor from Joby Aviation. "I like that in the span of a year, I'm going to be able to build a robot and learn how to program it, "says Lucia Assencio de Saarvedra '24, from Madrid, Spain.

As one would expect, there are significant costs involved with getting a club like this started. Thus far, finances have been raised

"We also had several private donors step forward to support the club," says Mustard. "I am really grateful for the support for this new program and opportunity for our MBA students."

While the club is off to a great start, the need to fundraise and find additional support remains critical, as the total cost of the club's expenses have not yet been met. With your

static aircraft are for hands-on learning of flight controls, operating systems, advances in construction, and exploring aerodynamics and control surfaces.

There are four phases, or class sections, to The Project Shop (PS1 though PS4). PS1 began this fall, with the focus on learning about tools; everything from how to hold a screwdriver to programming and running 3D printers and CNC mills—with safety being the core goal. As tooling is learned, students begin a familiarization with materials; wood, plastics, carbon fiber, and various metals—learning structural properties and uses. Observation and assistance with ongoing real-world R&D projects is a bonus.

PS2 will begin second semester. Students will begin working with the more advanced

equipment and materials and have more hands-on involvement with both production and R&D teams.

PS3 will have students become part of an R&D project team. Beyond helping with design and fabrication, PS3 will involve the students with coding, cost tracking, research, marketing, and customer interface.

Students will culminate The Project Shop study with PS4—designing their own project for scholastic competition and or trade show.

As successive semesters advance, by the end of school year 2024, all phases will be running concurrently thereafter.








CONGRATULATIONS, CLASS OF 2022!

CLASSROOM ENHANCEMENTS

ast spring, MBA teachers were asked by the Allred Trust, "If you had the budget for your classroom, what would you ask for to enhance the learning experience of our students?" Initial responses were cautious: a \$14 desk tray to help students organize, or a loaner phone charger for student use, with the teacher saying, "I know it's a lot at \$45, but...."

Thinking this was not a serious question and often just having-to-make-do, along with not realizing a specific *Teacher Ask Fund* had been set up, was the source reason for the judicious responses of the faculty. One teacher, questioning the seriousness of the request, asked, "Surely they don't *really* want to know what I'd buy, because they won't have the money if I told them."

After the faculty were reassured that this offer was legitimate, each teacher who submitted a request was able to meet with the Allred Trust representative to review their needs. Ultimately, \$113,000 was approved for the combined classroom requests. Teachers were issued approved budgets for their individual requests and provided purchase


orders that allowed them to source their specific items.

Some of the classroom improvements include a new and larger projection screen, a reading nook for the English classroom, updated and sufficient supply of physics and chemistry equipment, life-size anatomical model for biology and physiology, 3D printer for technology, interactive teaching games and software, new desks for three classrooms, replacement scuba gear, equipment for video production and editing, and budgeting to repair musical instruments.











GIANT OF A MAN

When you reflect back on your life, is there someone who has impacted your life to an extent that it helped you become the person you are today? Is there someone who poured love, mercy, kindness, or forgiveness into your life and because of it you were changed?

What follows is a tribute to Dan Zinke, boys' dean from 1978–1984, written by **Stan Wheeler** '81. Dean Zinke had a tremendous influence on Stan, as well as many boys who passed through the doors of Voth Hall. This beautiful tribute perfectly embodies the theme of this issue of *Sandscripts*–pouring out our hearts, our love, and our care on others.

was 15 years old when I moved into the boy's dorm in the fall of 1978. Of course, one of the first people I met was the head dean, Dan Zinke, a man I would grow to respect and admire over the next three years.

Dean Zinke was a giant of a man in physical size. I lived just a few doors down the hall from Dean Zinke's apartment, and it was not uncommon, if my room was open, for him to stop and spend a few moments in conversation as he headed to his apartment. Due to his height, he would almost completely fill the doorway, as he nonchalantly leaned against the door frame and joked with us.

Beyond his physical size, Dean Zinke was an extraordinary man of character. His demeanor was always cheerful, jovial, and fun-loving. Harmless practical jokes were always greeted with a smile and good natured ribbing. I remember one time, when a group of about six guys made an attempt to "take him down" in the hallway. Although he may have slowed and staggered a little, he was able to continue making forward progress

carrying, pushing, and dragging the young men down the hall while laughing the whole time. I don't ever remember seeing him angry in any situation. He was simply so fun to be around that many of us took great pleasure in sitting for a few minutes in his office or in the den just to visit with this authority figure who took an interest in each of us. He willingly poured kindness, love, and care into our lives and always had time for us—no matter what he was doing.

Dorm activities are another great memory I have of Dean Zinke—Boys' Club events that were organized by the dean, watching sports and special events on a TV that Dean Zinke would set up in the den, spotlight tag on the beach where the deans wielded handheld spotlights trying to "catch" boys crawling over the sand dunes and through ice plant to get safely to base without being detected—are a few that come to mind of him pouring time, attention, and thoughtfulness into the boys. Then there was, of course, the slip 'n slide that was set up on the lawn between the cafeteria and the music building. An epic event where the boys would scatter like bowling pins as Dean Zinke came down the hill like a cannonball.

Creating a spiritual atmosphere in the dorm was also important to Dean Zinke. Dorm worship was a special time when he focused on helping us see the value of a relationship with Jesus. The dorm was full to overflowing in those days with about 250 boys, so the dorm chapel nearly burst at the seams when we crowded onto the wooden benches. I will never forget the resounding chorus of favorites like *Sound the Battle Cry* or *Seeking the Lost*, led by this giant of a man,

who enjoyed the singing every bit as much as we did. I think we probably rocked the foundations of that poor building, and I'm sure we could be heard all over campus.

Dean Zinke's intentionality of building relationships with the boys was evident in everything he did. He spent so much time with us that on the rare occasion when we had to be disciplined, we accepted the consequences of our actions because we knew we were loved unconditionally and he would go to all lengths to reconcile and maintain the relationship he had formed with us. The impact this giant of a man had on the lives he came in contact with is countless because of what he poured into our lives. I feel fortunate to have had Dean Zinke as a mentor and a friend. Many of my memories of MBA will continue to revolve around his influence on my life and his leadership in the dorm.

Dan, and his wife, Jennifer, currently live in Travelers Rest, SC, where they are enjoying retirement. Thank you, Dean Zinke, for the impact you have made on the lives of so many. Your influence will be felt for many years.


